#### H. 1972 OCCUPATION AND HAZARDOUS SPORTS CODES

Annuities has prepared the 1972 Occupation Code to be used in place of the 1926 Occupation Code in intercompany studies. This revision was prompted by the obsolescence of the 1926 Code, which is a complex code that provides for considerably more detail than is needed for the reduced occupational hazards that exist today. It is also felt that a standard, simplified code will be useful for other purposes such as studies of markets and persistency experience.

The new Occupation Code is a three-digit numerica! code, derived from the 1970 Census Occupational Classificational Code. The first digit denotes the general occupational classification (e.g., professional, managerial, and so on), and the second digit provides for subgroups under each of these classifications. For most occupations the first two digits can be determined by reference to the "Summary of 1972 Occupation Codes," and the third digit is zero. The codes for the more hazardous occupations have a 1 or a 2 for the third digit. Coding of these occupations requires reference to the table of "Expanded Coding for Hazardous Occupations." An Alphabetical Index and an Industry Index have been prepared to aid in the classification of occupations. The Industry Index should be helpful in coding occupations that are not listed. The code for the listed occupation most similar to the actual occupation should be selected.

For companies that use punched-card equipment and have only two digits available for occupational coding, X and Y overpunches can be used in place of the third digit. For companies that use tape equipment, an alpha-numeric code can be devised, with a different letter used as the second digit in lieu of the second-and-third-digit combination (Example 1).

A two-digit Hazardous Sports Code has also been prepared. As with the Occupation Code, companies could eliminate the last digit by the use of either X and Y overpunches or an alphabetical code to suit their own needs for coding purposes (Example 2).

- 2. If a person participates in two or more nonratable hazardous sports, select the most appropriate code, generally the code for the sport with the most frequent participation.
- 3. If a person participates in one ratable hazardous sport and one or more nonratable hazardous sports, code the ratable hazardous sport.
