Physician's Statement

Patient was visited using Remote House Call technology.

Patient appears alert, responds promptly and appropriately to questions, does not volunteer information. Skin condition and color look good. No sign erythema at pressure points.

Head and neck: No problems observed. Teeth and gums look good.

Back: No problems observed.

Abdominal: Normal

Extremities: No change in condition. Wheelchair confined due to loss of mobility in both legs.

Standard monitoring results – See Adele's Report.

Still slightly underweight.

Patient compliance with medication seems to have improved. Little or no resistance to taking the prescribed doses. I think Adele really knows how to handle her.

No other significant changes.

Recommend:

Continue around-the-clock monitoring of this patient.

Food order continues – low carbohydrate, soft foods, strained, plus 8 oz. of over-the-counter liquid dietary supplement per day. Six ounces per day of calcium-fortified orange juice. Medications:

Oral diabetes – no change, one tablet per day, crushed in food.
